Biographical Notes on the Speakers

Jenny ANDERSSON is an associate professor in economic history at the Swedish Institute for Futures Studies and CNRS research fellow at the Centre d'études et de recherches internationales at Sciences-po, Paris. She has written extensively on European social democracy, economic thought and futures studies. She is the author of the forthcoming work 'The Library and the Workshop: Social Democracy and Capitalism in an Age of Knowledge' (Stanford University Press, 2009).

Saša BOZIC is an associate professor at the Department of Sociology, University of Zadar, Croatia. He is a co-director of the graduate course 'Divided Societies' at the Inter-University Centre in Dubrovnik. He has headed several projects dealing with migration, ethnicity and multiculturalism. He has published internationally on related issues and is currently leading the project 'Transnational migration – challenges to Croatian society'.

Annelies BRUHNE graduated in social sciences (university, diploma degree) and has a Master of European Studies (main subject: politics, economics, communication, law). Since 2005, she has worked at *unitransfer*, Hannover: Organization and implementation of international co-operation events for SMEs, (CeBIT 2006: Future match). She is a part-time staff member of the Innovation Relay Centre Lower Saxony/Saxony-Anhalt; project work for the European ETI-project 'PLATON'. Her experience to date includes: EU Liaison Office Hannover/ Hildesheim (assistance to project management and consultation for project application in the Sixth Research Framework).

Simone van der BURG is an embedded ethicist in the context of biophysical engineering research conducive to the development of two medical devices (University of Twente, the Netherlands). She received her Ph.D. from the Free University in Amsterdam (2007) and worked as an assistant professor of ethics and technology at the technical universities of Eindhoven (2001-2006) and Delft. She has authored numerous articles e.g. on Science and Engineering Ethics and Social Epistemology- and two books (in Dutch).

Louise BELTZUNG studied socio-economics at the University of Economics in Vienna. She is a researcher at the ICCR and is participating in the SSH FUTURES and PLATON+ project. She was Research Assistant to the International Centre for Migration Policy Development and Applied Research Consortium from June 2008 to March 2009 in a project concerning trafficking with human beings. Since 2002, she has worked as a freelance reporter with articles published in the Austrian daily 'DerStandard' and the German magazine 'dieZeit'. From 2007 to July 2009 she was the head of the Universities and Schools Section of 'DerStandard'.

Chris CASWILL is currently Visiting Professor at the Department of Politics, University of Exeter, and Visiting Fellow, James Martin Institute, University of Oxford. He is also an Honorary Senior Fellow, at the Department of Science and Technology Studies, University College, London; Senior Research Associate, Interdisciplinary Centre for Comparative Research in the Social Sciences (Vienna) and Research Associate at the NIFU STEP Institute in Oslo. He is a member of the editorial board of the *European Journal for the Social Sciences*, of the Professorial Appointment Panel, Middlesex University, and was a visiting lecturer at the University of Lausanne between 2000 and 2004. Between 1988 and 2003, he was Director of Research at the UK Economic and Social Research Council. He is Senior Policy Adviser to the Academy of Finland for the NORFACE ERA-NET project.

Bertrand CAZALET is a public law researcher at the University of Perpignan (France). Since 2000, he has worked mainly on questions of law and the administration of the environment, applied to coastal/marine spaces. His research focuses on developing countries (West Africa) and the Mediterranean region (with the FAO Department of Fisheries) and the French overseas. Bertrand Cazalet is currently engaged in three French research programmes (Gaius-PAMPA-GRAMP) on the governance of marine-protected areas in a multidisciplinary approach.

Rossitsa CHOBANOVA is a senior researcher affiliated to the Department of Economics at the Bulgarian Academy of Sciences (BAS). Her research has appeared in academic journals in Austria, Bulgaria, the Czech Republic, China, Germany, Hungary, Poland, the Netherlands, Russia, UK, and also in EC publications. She holds a D.Sc. degree (*'Innovativeness of a national economy'*) from the High Attestation Commission to the Government of Bulgaria, a Ph.D. from Moscow State University and an M.A. from the University of National and World Economy in Sofia. The seven social sciences BAS departments have elected her a member of the academic council at the Center for Education at the BAS. She is the elected scientific secretary for social sciences at the BAS.

Henriette van EIJL's main responsibilities are to co-ordinate the activities of the Lead Market Initiative and to contribute to the development of future European innovation policy activities in the EC's Directorate General for Enterprise and Industry's Innovation Policy unit. After her B.Sc. (King's College) and M.Sc. (Imperial College) in London, she worked in industry, before going up to Oxford University where she completed a D.Phil. in molecular biology. She was recruited by the European desk of the Dutch Ministry of Economic Affairs. The Dutch government seconded her to the EC's Research DG's Health and Biotechnology, where she was a fund/project manager for four years. This was followed in May 2007 by a permanent posting to her current position at the EC.

Gregor FITZI is a researcher at the Department of Philosophy of the University of Florence (since 2004). 1992: University of Florence, Master's Degree in philosophy and literature (110/110 Laude). 1999: University of Bielefeld, Faculty of Sociology, Ph.D. in sociology (Magna cum laude). 2000-2004: University of Heidelberg, Department of Sociology, assistant professor.

Carin FRANZÉN is an associate professor in comparative literature at the Department of Language and Culture, Linköping University. She received her Ph.D. from the Department of Literature and History of Ideas, Stockholm University, in 1996. The Swedish Research Council is funding her current project, *'Courtly Love as a Feminine Strategy'*.

Anne-Sophie GODFROY-GENIN works as an associate professor at the University Paris 12-Val de Marne and as a researcher in the Unit STEF (Sciences Technique Education Formation) at the École Normale Supérieure de Cachan. She received her Ph.D. in philosophy from the University of Paris Sorbonne. She has participated in many EU-funded research projects about women in science and technology: INDECS, WOMENG, PROMETEA, MOTIVATION, HELENA. As a philosopher with extensive experience with international and interdisciplinary research projects in science studies, her current research deals with comparative methodologies in science studies and philosophy for science in use.

Arvydas GUOGIS is an associated professor at the Public Administration Department of Mykolas Romeris University, Vilnius, Lithuania. He has worked on many research projects dealing with social administration and social policy (including EU PHARE, COST, Swedish Institute programmes) and has published several books (also published by Nova Publishers and Eugrimas).

Patricia van HEMERT is working as a researcher at the VU Center for Entrepreneurship. She has a background in European Studies, University of Amsterdam. She is participating in two European Commission Sixth Framework Programs: 'Dynamic Regions in a Knowledge-Driven Global Economy: Lessons and Policy Implications for the EU (DYNREG)', and 'Social Sciences and Humanities Futures (SSH-Futures)'. Her research interests are in theoretical and empirical studies of innovation, knowledge and entrepreneurship, economic growth issues, and of policy studies. These issues are also the subjects of her Ph.D., on which she is currently working.

Edwin HORLINGS is a senior researcher in the Science System Assessment Department of the Rathenau Institute in the Netherlands. His main areas of research are the organization, financing and dynamics of science. Some of the issues currently under investigation are the impact of investments in big science, the emerging field of computational social science and the dynamics of taxonomy. In his earlier career, he was a senior analyst at RAND and a quantitative macro-economic historian.

Allan JANIK is a philosopher and co-author of the book *Wittgenstein's Vienna*, and is Senior Research Fellow at the University of Innsbruck's 'Brenner Archives Research Institute'. His recent publications include *Towards a New Philosophy for the European Union* and *Military Competence in War Amongst the People*.

Jeffrey JOHNSON is Professor of Complexity Science and Design. He joined the Open University in 1980 after three years as Senior Research Associate in the Geography Department of Cambridge University and six years as Research Fellow in the Mathematics Department of Essex University. He is the Head of the Department of Design, Development, Environment and Materials.

Sandra KARNER is a researcher at the IFZ - Inter-University Research Centre for Technology, Work and Culture, and a lecturer at Klagenfurt University and the University of Graz. Her research focuses on issues of participation related to the involvement of the public in research, trans-disciplinarity and science governance. Currently, she is co-ordinating a 'co-operative' research project involving civil society organizations in research on alternative agro-food networks.

Philippe KERAUDREN is deputy head of unit at DG Research in the programme for social sciences and the humanities. He is currently in charge of the development of international cooperation within the framework of the European Research Area and follows several EU funded projects on the European Research Area in Social Sciences and the Humanities, including SSH Futures.

Phil C. LANGER is a social psychologist with a first Ph.D. in literature and a second one in psychology, currently working as a researcher at the Bundeswehr Institute of Social Sciences in Strausberg near Berlin and as a lecturer at the Department of Psychology at Munich University. His areas of research include military issues (international peace-keeping missions; intercultural competence), Gender and Queer Studies, HIV/AIDS, National Socialism/Holocaust and qualitative methodology. He is an elected member of the Scientific Board on Social Sciences and Public Health of the German Competence Network HIV/AIDS and an associated member of the Center of Transdisciplinary Gender Studies in Berlin. He possesses working experience in youth and adult education (e.g. as a guide to the Holocaust Memorial in Berlin and as head of youth prevention at the Berlin AIDS NGO).

Les LEVIDOW is a Senior Research Fellow at the Open University, UK. There he has been studying agri-environmental issues since 1989, mainly through five EC-funded research projects. He coordinates an FP7 project entitled '*Co-operative Research on Environmental Problems in Europe*' (CREPE) and is a partner of another project, '*Facilitating Alternative Agri-Food Networks*' (FAAN).

Claire LÉVY-VROELANT is a professor in sociology at the University of Paris 8 Saint-Denis. She is qualified for the functions of a professor in two sections of the French National Committee of the Universities: demography-sociology and urbanism and urban planning. She is the co-ordinator of the Master of Sociology programme at the same university. She is in charge of ERASMUS and CREPUQ (Québec) for students and staff mobility in sociology in Paris 8 University. Since 1990, she has been a researcher at the Centre de Recherche sur l'Habitat (UMR LOUEST, CNRS) and was on the executive board of the centre in 2005-2006. She is a member of the executive board of GIS socio-économie de l'Habitat (CNRS), where she is responsible for the International Programme. She has also been a member of IUSSP (International Union for Scientific Study of Populations) since 1998.

Mark MCCARTHY is Professor of Public Health at University College London and head of research for the European Public Health Association. He has worked as a consultant to the World Health Organization and the European Commission and is currently involved in three collaborative studies of European public health research.

Ekkehard MOCHMANN studied economics, social sciences and law at the Universities of Cologne and Bonn. He is the executive manager of the Central Archive for Empirical Social Research at the University of Cologne and director of GESIS, the German Social Science Infrastructure Services. His special research interests include methods of comparative research, integration of the European database and computer-aided content analysis in political research. His research and development work includes the design of database and information retrieval systems for application in social research, comparative research on democratization processes and violence and research and teaching of the computer-aided content analysis of political documents and speeches. Currently, he is serving as President of the International Federation of Data Organization for the Social Sciences and is honorary board member of the Council of European Social Science Data Archives. He is also serving on the *Conseil scientifique du Comité de concertation pour les données en sciences humaines et sociales* of the French Research Department, on the Committee '*Towards a future data-*

infrastructure for the social sciences' of the Royal Netherlands Academy of Arts and Sciences and on the OECD/CSTP drafting group '*Issues of access to publicly funded research data*'.

Ülle MUST has taught at university (master courses at the Department of History and Archaeology of the University of Tartu) and worked in R&D policy administration (member of the board of the Archimedes Foundation). Her main research interests are in bibliometric studies. She is a member of the advisory board on scientometrics and member of the editorial board of the COLLNET Journal of Scientometrics and Information Management.

Peter NIJKAMP is a professor in regional and urban economics and in economic geography at the Free University, Amsterdam. His main research interests cover plan evaluation, multi-criteria analysis, regional and urban planning, transport systems analysis, mathematical modelling, technological innovation and resource management. In recent years, he has focused his research in particular on quantitative methods for policy analysis and on the behavioural analysis of economic agents. He has broad expertise in the area of public policy, services planning, infrastructure management and environmental protection. He is a member of the editorial boards of more than 20 journals. He has been a visiting professor to many universities all over the world. He is a past president of the European Regional Science Association and of the Regional Science Association International. He is also a fellow of the Royal Netherlands Academy of Sciences and was the last vice-president of this organization. Since June 2002, he has served as president of the governing board of the Netherlands Research Council (NWO).

Paolo PARRA SAIANI is a teacher at the Catholic University in Milan, Italy, at the Universidad Tres de Febrero, Buenos Aires and the Universidad Nacional de La Plata, Argentina. His research interests include social indicators (objective and subjective), quality of life and social research methodology in general. He is a member of the Scientific Committee of the Methodological Section of the Italian Sociological Association (AIS).

Martin PETERSON is a professor at the Universities of Bergen, Norway and Gothenburg, Sweden. He has been a member of the Globalization Committee of the Swedish Research Council since January 1993, and has published several books on issues of European integration, comparative industrial relations, the anatomy of the nation-state and democracy for the 21st century. He was the head of the interdisciplinary faculty programme on Europe during the 1990s.

Sonja PETROVICS is a landscape planner and works for the Austrian Mountain Farmers' Association (ÖBV-Via Campesina Austria). Her research focuses on cultural landscape, regional management and peasant farming. Her involvement with ÖBV-Via Campesina Austria enables her to combine political activism with research interests. Additionally, she holds a position as a lecturer at the University of Applied Life Sciences and Natural Resources in Vienna.

Ronald J. POHORYLES is the director of the ICCR Vienna, president of the ICCR International, senior lecturer for comparative political systems at the University of Innsbruck, and President of the European Association for the Advancement of Social Sciences. He is co-editor of the book series *Contemporary Trends in European Social Sciences* and of the journal *The European Journal of Social Sciences -- Innovation*, both of which he launched. His research expertise covers European integration, emphasising public policy analysis, science and technology with a focus on internationalization, East-West relations and the process of accession, environmental sociology and

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Rafael POPPER is a researcher at PREST Manchester Institute of Innovation Research, University of Manchester. He is co-editor of an Edward Elgar's Book of the Month (*The Handbook of Technology Foresight*) and author of two Emerald's *Literati Network* award-winning papers on foresight methods and practices in six world regions. He has also authored European Commission publications (e.g. *Mapping Foresight*) and he has been a member of the EC's Expert Group on Rationales for the European Research Area. He has participated in several international foresight projects and he is currently leading an EC FP7 Blue Sky research on wild cards and weak signals (iKNOW project).

Andrea RICCI is Vice-President of ISIS, Institute of Studies for the Integration of Systems, Rome. He received his engineering degree at Ecole Centrale (Paris). His key focuses are sustainability, policy analysis and impact assessment, energy studies and foresight. Among many publications, he authored the EC Report on *The overall socio-economic dimension of community research in the fifth European framework programme*.

Nanna ROSENFELDT is an advisor, European Affairs, at DEA. Her expertise covers the European Framework Programmes for Research and Business-Research relations in the field of the Social Sciences and Humanities. Before DEA, she worked in the international office of Danish Employers, based in Brussels, where she dealt with the European labour market as well as education policy and regulation. She has an M.A. in European Business, European University College Brussels, EHSAL, Association Leuven University and an M.A. in Translation and Interpretation, French, Copenhagen Business School.

Gisèle SAPIRO is a research director at the CNRS (Centre de sociologie européenne, Paris). She is the author of *La Guerre des écrivains, 1940-1* (Fayard, 1999) and of many articles on the sociology of intellectuals. She edited or co-edited *Pour une histoire des sciences sociales* (Fayard, 2004); *Pierre Bourdieu, sociologue* (Fayard, 2004) ; *Translation. Le marché de la traduction en France à l'heure de la mondialisation* (CNRS Editions, 2008); *Les Contradictions de la globalisation éditoriale* (Nouveau Monde, 2009); *L'Espace intellectuel en Europe* (La Découverte, 2009).

Andrea SCHMOELZER is Deputy Head of the Unit for Humanities, Cultural and Social Sciences at the Federal Ministry of Science and Research in Austria. She did her Ph.D. in Political Sciences. Due to her previous work for DG Research she has long-standing experience with international social science and humanities projects.

Roger SCHOENMAN is an assistant professor at the Department of Politics at the University of California, Santa Cruz. His primary empirical research explores the relationships emerging across post-communist Europe between business, political parties and the state. He also works on the role of social networks and technology in the mobilization of mass protest movements and, more generally, the potential insights of relational approaches in the study of politics.

Tal SOFFER has been a senior researcher at ICTAF since 1992. She is an expert in the fields of education and labour relations. Her special interests include: trends in the future labour market, future occupations and skills and education. She also specializes in the diffusion of innovation in the

educational field, e.g. web-supported learning. She is a consultant to policy decision makers in the Israeli Ministries of Education and Labour, as well as to other ICTAF clients, such as the EU, 'NA'AMAT' – The Israeli Women's Labour Organization, etc. She is currently a Ph.D. research student at Tel Aviv University and her dissertation is entitled 'Diffusion of Web- Supported Academic Instruction'. She is also the Financial and Personnel Director at ICTAF.

Andrew SORS is Rector of the Collegium Budapest, the Institute for Advanced Studies. After completing his Ph.D. in materials science at the University of Sussex, he worked as a research engineer in the chemical industry. This was followed by 7 years as the deputy director of the Monitoring and Assessment Research Centre (MARC) at the University of London. MARC was an internationally funded research institution addressing global environmental challenges. Between 1982 and the start of his mandate as rector, Mr. Sors worked for the EC. His most recent assignments there were as Head of the Unit for SSH Research (1999-2005) and, over the last three years (2005-2008), he was based in New Delhi as Minister Counsellor and Head of Science and Technology at the EC's Delegation to India, Bhutan and Nepal. Throughout his career, his assignments have included Visiting Professor at the University of Manchester, Advisory Group Chair for the University of East Anglia's Research Centre on the Global Environment and joint-founding Managing Editor of the international peer review journal 'Environmental Monitoring and Assessment'.

Tereza STÖCKELOVÁ is committed to studies of science and technology. She completed her Ph.D. studies in sociology at Charles University in 2008 ('Biotechnologization: Legitimacy, materiality and instantiations of resistance' on the expert and political controversies over GMOs in the CR and EU). She has worked on an ethnographic study of changing research practices and environments in the CR, the constitution and role of expertise in environmental issues and the reflexive movements of knowledge between science and society. She works at the Institute of Sociology of the Academy of Sciences and collaborates with the NGO Green Circle on a research and advocacy project developing new modes of collaboration between NGOs, the public and the academic sector.

Elisabeth SUNDIN has a Ph.D. and is a professor in business administration and management at Linköping University, Sweden. She is also one of the senior researchers at HELIX, a Vinn Excellence Centre on 'Managing Mobility for Learning, Health and Innovation'. Her main research fields are organizational changes, especially public sector organizations, described and analyzed from the perspectives of SMEs, entrepreneurship and gender. She is also interested in the methods and development of the Social Sciences.

Marko TADIC is a linguist and professor at the University of Zagreb, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, Department of Linguistics and Vice-Dean of the same Faculty since 2009. He has had the Chair of Algebraic and Computational Linguistics at the same department since 2001 and has been an associated member of the Croatian Academy of Sciences and Arts since 2008. He has published more than 60 papers and a book entitled *Jezične tehnologije i hrvatski jezik* (Language Technologies and the Croatian Language) and he is also one of the authors of the first Croatian frequency dictionary. His interests lie in corpus linguistics (Croatian National Corpus), computational linguistics (Croatian Morphological Lexicon), language technologies (Computational Linguistic Models and Language Technologies for Croatian) and research infrastructures (NCP for Croatian in project CLARIN).

François THOREAU is a Ph.D. candidate from the F.R.S.-FNRS and research fellow at the Scientific and Public Involvement Risk Allocations Laboratory (SPIRAL). His doctoral dissertation is in the field of

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Stefan THURNER is a professor of the science of complex systems at the Medical University of Vienna and an external professor at the Santa Fe Institute. His training is in theoretical physics (Ph.D. from the Technical University of Vienna in 1995) and in financial economics (Ph.D. from Vienna University in 2001). His main interests are the scientific foundations of a science of complex systems and its applications in life science, economics and the social sciences. Since 1995, he has published more than 120 scientific articles on fundamental physics, applied mathematics, complex systems theory, life sciences, economics and lately in social sciences (opinion formation and bureaucratic inefficiency). He holds 2 patents.

Wojciech WOZNIAK has worked as a researcher and lecturer at the Department of General Sociology, University of Łódź since 2003. Currently, he is finishing his Ph.D. thesis on interrelations between politics and social policy. Between 2004 and 2007 he served as a research fellow and member of the co-ordinating team in the international research project PROFIT (Policy Responses Overcoming Factors in the International Transmission of Inequalities), funded under the 6th FP and co-ordinated by the Department of Sociology, University of Łódź. It was a comparative study on the social inequalities in reproduction in eight European countries and on policies aimed at reducing the scope of this phenomenon. He has published about 20 articles or book chapters on social and educational policy, poverty and inequalities in its perception. At the University he teaches courses on social inequalities, an introduction to sociology and the sociology of the family. His research interests include qualitative methodology, the sociology of medicine and the sociology of sport.

Gad YAIR (Ph.D. 1994) is an associate professor and chairman of the Department of Sociology and Anthropology at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. He holds the Ann and Louis Wolens Chair in Educational Research. His academic interests are focused on sociological theory and its history and the sociology of education. In recent years, he has studied the cultural bases of social theory, focusing on American, French and German social theory. His studies on this subject appear in *Sociology*, *European Journal of Social Theory*, *Max Weber Studies*, the *Open Sociology Journal*, *Sociological Review*, and the *Journal of Classical Sociology*. His previous book (with Michaela Soyer)—*The Golem and German Social Theory*—was published by Lexington Books in 2008; a new book, *Pierre Bourdieu: The Last Musketeer of the French Revolution*, is due to be published in October 2009.

Tadeusz ZOLTOWSKI is the President of the Foundation for European Scientific Co-operation. He is Professor of European Studies and pro-rector of the Warsaw School of Business. He teaches EU policies at the Centre of European Studies of the University of Lodz. For several years he worked for the Council of Ministers (Director of Department), and was involved in the negotiations for the European Agreement and accession to the EU. He was a political advisor to the President of the National Labour Office. In 1997- 2000, he was the Director of the Office for European Co-operation at the Foundation for Polish Science, responsible for implementing the Phare SCI-TECH Programmes for reforms in Poland's science sector. Prof. Zoltowski's research areas are EU policies, especially related to science and technological development, and issues of regional development. He has authored and co-authored about 100 scientific publications.
